

How Will You Fulfill Your Vow?

e begin the month of August with our annual Ministry Fair. This affords members of our family the chance to once again witness the variety of ministries that our parish engages in and it also serves as an opportunity for each of us to be identifying areas in which we might become partners.

It is important for us to recognize that God invites us to collaborate with Him in the establishment of His kingdom. It is equally important for us to remember that even though he made us "without our aid", He does need us in this adventure of Kingdom building. He has chosen to equip us by His Spirit to do the work of ministry, rather than ignoring us and doing it Himself.

I wonder why, then, we often chose to ignore Him?

At our baptism we promised God that we would actively be part of His work, and this coming month each of us can fulfill that promise by finding a spot and stepping up to the plate!

St. Paul uses the metaphor of a body and suggests that each of us are members of one body and we all have a function. We all have an action or task to complete. No one has been baptized to sit idly by no matter how good we think our excuses may be.

The principle that dominates most organizations is that 20% of the members do 80% of the work. But Paul says that we are not "of this world" so this same rule should not be in effect in our community of faith.

Imagine how much would get done for God if everyone in the parish participated in one ministry.

The historic Anglican 'Rule of Life' suggests:

time to time frame for himself a RULE OF LIFE in accordance with the precepts of the Gospel and the faith and order of the Church; wherein he may consider the following:

The regularity of his attendance at public worship and especially at the Holy Communion.

The practice of private prayer, bible reading, and self-discipline.

Bringing the teaching and example of Christ into his everyday life.

The boldness of his spoken witness to his faith in Christ.

His personal service to the Church and the community.


The offering of money according to his means for the support of the work of the Church at home and overseas".

Historically the parish verger would not be dissimilar to a liturgical police, making sure that everything 'ran' smoothly and that all of the pieces were in place for meaningful worship on Sundays. In this role, Bev will help bring together all of the different

volunteers week after week, in order to help us worship more meaningfully.

On most Sundays Bev will be in the sanctuary with the rest of the worship team, but her role will be more of a supervisory one.

needs of our community and assuring that they are met in an expedient and caring way.

This means that he will help in the scheduling of pastoral visits, hospital visitations and in identifying and meeting other pastoral needs as they arise.

As we grow as a parish and our needs expand, with fewer clergy than we have had recently, it has been important to identify ways and means of seeing that the



On the Verge of Invisible: Bev Mahan Takes On the Role of Verger

hen Bev Mahan came to Nashville 31 years ago to attend Vanderbilt's Peabody College, St. B's was always part of the equation. After all, her hometown parish priest called St. B's office and arranged lodging, via Fr. Chuck Murphy, for the fresh-faced psychology student. From that point on, there was little question as to where she'd worship. When Bev retired from Vanderbilt in 2008, that decades old question of 'how should I serve' came calling again. After all, she had long been passionate about worship

and liturgy and had more time to get involved. But God convinced her to sit and wait.

and also to use as a weapon to protect the priest, which is why the verger typically led the procession to begin with: To protect the priest. Vergers dug graves, and in a lot of churches, the verger is also the sexton, the person responsible for cleaning up the mess.

It's such an incredible privilege to lead in worship. Just watching people receive communion, having a role to play in such a sacred moment. ...Ultimately, we're trying to be invisible, to serve with precision and give our best in worship.

But for our purposes here at St. B's, she explains: "The Verger is like a master of ceremonies, responsible for everyone and everything needed in a public service." How that plays out, she says, varies from church to church. "That's part of the dance," she says, "working within the framework of that, and yet exploring the variety within the Anglican Communion."

Bev sees her new role as an advisory one, a shepherd who comes alongside the ministry team captains already in

In the years since, St. B's has been an integral part of Bev's life. "My husband Tom and I were married at St. B's. Our kids were baptized here. We thought about looking elsewhere on occasion, but laziness kept us here sometimes." She came. She stayed. And she got involved.

Despite a busy schedule as a

professor at Vanderbilt University, Bev and Tom had always been involved in ministry at St. B's. "We've done just about everything, with the exception of serving on the Vestry," Bev says. "And that one, we studiously avoided, turned down the request to run until finally, when Jerry brought in the new way of electing vestry, I ran and was not elected. Whew! God said 'No thanks.' And I was glad." Still, she always thought 'I should be doing something at church.'

place to ensure that "a certain sacredness isn't lost in our casualness." And hopefully, she says, "to free up the pastor to be the pastor" by being the liturgical gatekeeper and question answerer...so he doesn't have to be.

"It's such an incredible privilege to lead in worship," she adds. "Just watching people receive communion, having a role to play in such a sacred moment. ...Ultimately, we're trying to be invisible, to serve with precision and give our best in worship." In pursuit of that invisibility and precision, Bev will attend the national verger convention in Washington, DC in October.

Eventually, she'll train more vergers to serve at St. B's.

Until then, Bev Mahan will wear the black and gray vestments and be the liturgical mafia, if you will. And yes, she's very excited about getting her own livestock whacker, upon the completion of her Verger training, currently in progress.

"My family teases me: 'It's the perfect job for you because you're so bossy!" she says, "but I'm really energized by it. I love it. I know it's what I'm supposed to be doing."

Movies are Sacramental

have acquired a new nickname: the movie guy. I think this is because for the last six years I have run a program called Film School. At Film School we do intentional Christian formation using current and classic films and our tag line is: "Making the sacramental connections between the story of God, the story of our lives and the story our culture is telling through the movie". This approach has been extremely successful and even spun off alternate classes (see Steven Lefebvre's article this issue) and weekend retreats, but I still get asked why I do it. Christians I meet seem to know there is something more to movies than simple entertainment, but can't always put their finger on exactly what it is. I

think this is because we've lost touch with the kind of storytelling our movies actually provide.

Every culture in human history has sought self-understanding and identity through common stories. Examples include famous Greek poems like the Iliad and the Odyssey, the coyote fables of the Hopi culture and even Grimm's fairly tales. Most of the parables Jesus told were actually twists on popular parables of his day. What all these narratives have in common is that they provide a vehicle through which their tellers and hearers can work out moral questions, pass on wisdom and make sense of the meaning of their lives.

I would submit that the place such storytelling happens today is in movies. More than anywhere else, our common stories are told through film, with celluloid functioning as our format and the cinema our ceremonial campfire.

Films provide us with shared metaphors, tag lines and experiences. They tell the epic Greek poems, moral fables and fairytales of our culture.

This is also why movies provide a most fertile ground for exploring how to live authentic Christian lives. The values, fears and dreams of our culture are on display in our movies because they are an expression of us. Therefore most movies (and there are exceptions to this;) provide a perfect place to start when teaching the Bible. Like one of Jesus' parables, the exploration of a character's choices can become the perfect place to examine your own. Like Grimm's fairy tales or an epic poem, the values of an entire culture can be revealed and surveyed

After the Credits - Questions to Consider

- What did the main character(s) in the story learn? Did they grow as people? If so, how?
- Did this movie have an overall "message"?
 What do you think it is?



- What do you think the director of the movie was trying to say with the film? How did they communicate that message?
- What similarities do you see between the world this film presents and the kingdom of God? What about differences?

by Biblical standards when they are examined through a provocative film.

Now, while it is true that many experience movies as passive entertainment, this does not have to be the case. Examining and interacting with movies as parable, fable and even epic poem takes work, but is rewarding. When watching films by yourself or with others consider some of the questions above after the credits roll. They can help make the sacramental connections between your story, God's story and story of the movie.

ECW Summer Luncheon The Group's Largest Gathering to Date

uring his recent visit to St. B's, Bishop Bauerschmidt referred to Ruth and Naomi of the Old Testament as social outcasts. It caught my attention because the ECW leadership has been studying the Book of Ruth for the last year. Our focus has been on their redeeming qualities, such as devotion, tenacity, vulnerability and sacrificial love, their model of fellowship between women. But they were also social outcasts, a burden to their community and



cultural misfits. This was not due to any intellectual or emotional handicap, or personal shortcoming in Ruth or Naomi. It was because their culture did not provide for the circumstances of their lives, namely being female, childless, and widowed. But God redeemed them, and through them established His chosen people.

In July, nearly 70 members of the ECW welcomed three graduates and employees of Magdalene Ministries to

their summer luncheon. Each shared their stories of past drug addiction, of being cast out by their families, unable to contribute to the community, cultural misfits. But God rescued them, using Magdalene Ministries as their kinsman redeemer. In their stories and interactions with each other, we saw tremendous faith and powerful evangelism, tenacity and strength of character, vulnerability and sacrificial love for each other and those of us present. I was struck by how much we had in common with our guests. Who among us has not felt cut off from fellowship with God and others by our sin and perceived shortcomings? How many of us have prayed for years about a troubling situation, or

Feeding the Hungry St. Luke's Community House and Mobile Loaves & Fishes

here are two regular opportunities to be involved in ministries to Nashville's hungry.

The first is **St. Luke's Community House**. Each week in *St. B's Weekly* you'll see a note about St. Luke's, with a suggested grocery item for the week. How much easier could it be? Next time you're out shopping, grab an extra item, then simply bring it to church on Sunday and place it in the basket in the Narthex. We deliver the collected items to the St. Luke's kitchen. Another regular opportunity to serve is with **Mobile Loaves and Fishes**, an

outreach ministry that provides food and clothing for the homeless and indigent working poor. The Mobile Loaves & Fishes truck goes out onto the city streets 7 days a week, 12 months a year thanks to the work of volunteers. The 3rd Tuesday night of each month volunteers from St. B's



load and deliver the meals to homeless camps and locations around Nashville. Volunteer opportunities are available on these dates plus other dates based on interest, as well as


be a part of the Anglican Communion and the implications of the Covenant.



Preschool (2 years old – Kindergarten) Group Publishing's "Hands-On Bible Curriculum"



Although this particular curriculum has been used by many churches across the nation for over a decade, it has been recently revised and

we're excited to offer this new version this Fall. "Hands-On" taps into a child's God-given desire to learn not just by listening and watching, but by doing.

"Hands-On" curriculum uses what is called a "one point learning" method. This simply means that rather then a multiple number of Bible points being taught and loosely retained, "Hands-On" lessons focus on one specific Bible point through activities and interaction. The goal at this early developmental stage is that the child will retain one life-applicable piece of Bible truth each week. And, over the following weeks and months, they'll not only remember but apply these truths in their daily lives.

These days, children don't think of information in the same way as in other generations. To them, all information is interconnected. With this in mind Rio presents Bible lessons as all part of the same incredible story written by God.

In this informational age, just because someone may know a lot about God it doesn't necessarily mean they know God. "Rio" stresses spiritual formation. "Every lesson is Godfocused, builds Bible study skills, and helps kids understand each Bible story in the context of God's grand redemptive plan throughout history".

Returning this Fall: Catechesis of the Good Shepherd

8:30am - For children 3 1/2 years-old (potty trained) through 7-years-old

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is not a curriculum but rather a method of religious formation which is "rooted in the Bible, the liturgy of the church, and the education principles of Maria Montessori." Developed by Sofia Cavaletti and Gianna Gobbi in Rome, Italy, it has been offered in the United States for over 25 years.

This method recognizes that an adult may study the Scripture, find a passage and ponder it's meaning, it's intent. He or she may choose to read further, offer up a prayer or discuss the passage with others. A child however, unable to read, needs another way to ponder and express what they hear from Scripture, lessons expressed that morning or a prayer from the liturgy. During class (referred to as the "atrium"), children are given a lesson from a New Testament parable, passage or lessons on our Eucharistic Prayer. They are then given time and materials (referred to as "work") to experience what they believe the Lord is speaking to them through art, sculpted New Testament figurines, maps, Eucharistic or liturgical furnishings or simply a quiet place to sit and pray. The work of the child becomes a prayer, a conversation with God.




Simply Christian


Ministry Spotlight: Altar Guild & Flower Guild





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Spotlight: Visitor Ministry

The purpose of our ministry to visitors is to welcome everyone who attends to worship God and to be the face of Christ to those who seek God at St. B'.

The commitment levels are:
