What We Believe

Who We Are

St. Bartholomew's Episcopal Church is a member of the Worldwide Anglican Communion of Churches, numbering 70 million people in 38 provinces worldwide. We are followers of Jesus Christ, and as Anglicans trace our origins back to Christ and His apostles. As Anglican Christians, we look to the Scripture first as the authority over the church, tradition (the practices and writings of the historical church) and reason, for allowing continued development of doctrine. We regard the Bible, the three Creeds (Nicene Creed, Apostles' Creed and Athanasian Creed), the Thirty-Nine Articles and the Book of Common Prayer (based on Scripture) as the principal statements of the Anglican doctrine.

then. Steve Thorne and Zena Carruthers-Thorne nurtured and grew St. B's participation for many years.

- St. B's has had supper clubs for many years, even decades. Members sign up on a list and are placed in a group with 11 other people. They meet, monthly, for a year to enjoy food and fellowship. They often become so close they take on activities as a team.
- Men's softball has been popular and active at St. B's since at least the early 1980s. Highlights of the early years include the great play of Ed Schoenberger and his multiple sons, all-star pitching by Bert Hardwick, routine appearances of Amy Grant in the stands (Scott Reall was her conditioning coach in those days), and a couple of church league championships under the direction of Coach Jim Stranch.
- The women's softball team called, Lilies of the Field, started up under the urging of Bev. Mahan, in 1992. The team didn't win a single game that first season. The league gave them the first and last Sportsmanship Award, which was nicknamed, the Miss Congeniality Award. In 1995, that same team was undefeated.

Cy Gebhardt, a retired accountant, exemplifies the people who have helped make St. B's what it is.

In 1983 he came to help work on the St. B's Preschool playground because many neighborhood children attended there. His wife had been a school teacher, fostering his fondness for the program and its impact. He became a helper, serving as a volunteer and financial supporter. He was also an encourager of the staff sending them candy every Valentine's Day.

Cy, while attending a service with preschool director Suzy Floyd, noticed the church needed stained glass windows. He donated five stained glass windows to St. B's, three in honor of St. B's Preschool and MDO, and two of the windows in memory of his wife, Ruth.

More Beez Bits

St. B's has an affiliation with 24 people who went on to ordained ministry within the Episcopal Church and elsewhere.

These include the Rev. Margaret Peel pictured with Bishop John Bauerschmidt during her ordination.



- Kristin Searfoss, a member of the congregation, wrote a column in The Branch for several years called, "Fly on The Wall," which won an Episcopal Communicators Award of Merit in 2008. Kristin, due to living with MS, wrote her columns using voice recognition software to conduct interviews by e-mail and to write and edit the copy. Her columns, without exception, are well written, informative, humorous and carefully edited.
- In 1956, St. B's held what was believed to be the first service of its kind: A ceremony to bless the land for the new parish house. They called it "a beating of the bounds." The ceremony came from a tradition around since the sixth century, where congregations process around the parish boundaries on the Sunday prior to Ascension Day.
- On any given Sunday, 40 volunteers are needed to run nursery, catechesis and Sunday school during the two services at St. B's. The breakdown is: 11 for nursery; nine for catechesis; and 20 for Sunday school (or Liturgy of the Word). Children's Formation has 4 fully certified catechists in Level 1 and 1 certified catechist for Level 2. Two are going through certification this coming year.
- Since 2003, St. B's youth have been on dojos to: DC, San Francisco, Mississippi, Memphis, Nashville, New Mexico, Arkansas, Monteagle, Altamont, Mexico and Kentucky. The spiritual formation trips dojo is Japanese for "place of the way" sometimes take a weekend and sometimes a week-long format.
- Room in the Inn has been at St. B's since 1987. The original group of six downtown congregations started RITI in December, 1986. Randall Ferguson and Jim Stranch brought RITI to St B's beginning January 1, 1987, placing St. B's in the first 12 congregations. St B's has an unbroken record of hosting RITI guests every Saturday night between November 1 and March 31 since

- In October of 1955, St. Bartholomew's held its first confirmation class with 28 members.
- In January of 1957, the church had 115 families and 272 communicants.
- Twin priests, Bruce and Duff Green, were ordained from St. B's.
- * The rectory has been lived in by only two rectors: Chuck Murphy and Jerry Smith. It has mostly served as housing for assistant rectors.
- * Leon Hunt Campbell was the first baby born and baptized into the St. B's family.
- The women of St. B's, in the early years, raised funds by putting bobby pins on cards. The pins came in 55-gallon drums.



Our History:

St. Bartholomew's Episcopal Church started in 1936 as a dream of the rector of Christ Church, the Rev. E.P. Dandridge. Rev. Dandridge envisioned expanding the Episcopal Church in the Lealand area, a fast-developing part of Nashville. Due to committee delays and World War II, it took more than a decade for the outreach vision to become reality. In 1951, the Rt. Rev. Dandridge, who was now bishop, formed a planning committee.

The first concrete step came with a large donation by Brownlee Curry, from St. George's Episcopal Church. The funds were designated for church expansion. Accordingly, in 1953 St. George's Church bought, for \$36,000, the current 18-acre St. B's property that faces onto both Granny White Pike and Belmont Park Terrace.

In 1954, a petition was drawn up and presented to Bishop Barth to establish a mission. The petition was backed by the signatures of 134 people (approximately 60 families) of Episcopalians living in the area. Authorization was granted by the bishop on September 14, 1954 and by the planning committee on October 6, 1954. An organizational meeting was held on October 24, 1954, at Burton School. Here, 107 people signed a transfer of membership to the new mission.

The first service of the new mission was held in Glendale School, November 7, 1954, with Bishop Dandridge officiating. Sewanee seminary students took services, with monthly communion provided by the Rev. Nutt Parsley. The communion wine was made by Bob Chilton. Because classrooms could not be used, Sunday school classes were conducted in the hallways. St. Bartholomew's was admitted as a parish at diocesan convention, January 19, 1955. The church had an identity, although no priest until September of 1955 – Bayard Clark.

The property saw groundbreaking on the church site on Sept. 6, 1964, and the cornerstone laid March 6, 1965. The rectory, built in 1961, was already in place, as was the parish hall, where services had been held since April 17,

Continuing in the Spirit

1957. The new parish was in the school only 17 months before moving to its own facilities.

Groundbreaking for the sanctuary took place September 6, 1964, with the first service held one year later, on September 5. Two weeks later, on September 19, the building was dedicated to Bishop Vander Horst. The parish hall was officially named Wallace Hall in honor of the 100th birthday of the church's oldest member, Louis Davenport Wallace.

The church continued to grow in body and spirit and on November 20, 1977, ground was broken for an extension on the parish hall that included a gymnasium and additional classrooms.

Those early years in the new building coincided with a world-wide movement of the Holy Spirit and St. Bartholomew's became fully involved in the movement, particularly after a weekend put on by Faith Alive. The Rev. Chuck Murphy, who became priest during this period, embraced the charismatic expression of Christianity and St. Bartholomew's was known for many years as a leader in the Episcopal charismatic movement.

The years that followed saw continued growth, but some tough decades for clergy, who did not, for various reasons, remain at St. B's. The programs, however, were robust and St. B's has had strong children's, youth, adult and music ministries.

Things changed dramatically for St. B's in the spring of 2004, when approximately half the congregation left the Episcopal Church and started Anglican Church of the Redeemer. The Rev. Jill Zook Jones filled in as interim until the current rector, the Rev. Dr. Jerry Smith arrived in January of 2005. Over the past decade, the church has regrown, rediscovering its Episcopal roots while affirming its evangelistic and evangelical theological leanings. St. Bartholomew's continues to seek God's direction.

Fast Facts

Origin of the Belmont Park Terrace property

Brownlee Currey bequeathed to St. George's Church a considerable sum of money for church expansion. St. George's vestry set aside \$36,000 to purchase the 18-acre site on which St. Bartholomew's Church now stands.

Origin of the Church name

St. Bartholomew's was the name of Bishop Dandridge's church in West Virginia and also Bishop Barth's church in

Baltimore, Maryland. St. Bartholomew was known as an Apostle of great faith and this name was selected from the four names suggested.

Origin of the Bell

The teenage son of Hilary and Ann Osborn, John Jay Osborn, learned of the availability of a 2,700 lb. cast-bronze bell originally forged at Meneely's Foundry in Troy, NY in 1852. The bell was purchased from a Nashville junkyard for \$450 with money the youth had saved. The bell was erected in 1957 with the help of parishioner, R.H. Chilton.

. The church publications was changed, accordingly, from the *St. B's Bulletin* to *The Bell.* It is now known as *The Branch*.

Origin of the Statue

of St. Bartholomew

Eleanor M. Mellon, a noted sculptress and artist, was a family friend of St. B's second rector, The Rev. Robert S. Hayden. It was her custom to do one religious work every year and give it as a pledge of her talent to the Lord.

She had given a bronze statue of St. Thomas to St. Thomas Church in Camden, Maine,

in memory of the Rev. Canon Ralph Hayden, father of St. B's rector at the time.

Her gift to St. B's, in honor of the second St. B's rector was dedicated on June 9, 1968, after the Rev. Giles F. Lewis Jr. had become rector.

Origin of the stained glass windows

The stained glass windows were designed and built by the Willet Stained Glass Company, Philadelphia. The small windows around the top of the sanctuary each depict an Old Testament scene. The longer ones represent New Testament events. In the nave, the 12 windows on the pulpit side depict the disciples, while those on the right depict key figures in the history of the Episcopal Church. A booklet put together by Dr. David Edwards details the windows and is available to those interested.



Origin of the Preschool Mother's Day Out program

In 1958, a week-day kindergarten program was started to utilize the Sunday school rooms throughout the week. It was discontinued in 1970 and the rooms were used by Head Start. In 1978, St. B's Mother's Day Out was started by Deen Logan. St. B's moms wanted more than babysitting. They wanted a Christian education program for their children as they attended a women's Bible study at the rector's house, taught by Ann Murphy.

As the Mother's Day Out program grew, parents wanted a more structured Christian early childhood program that would equip children for kindergarten. With the prayers and help of Ann Murphy, Suzy Floyd, director of the M.D.O. started the St. B's preschool, in 1983. Over the years, the Preschool and Mother's Day Out has grown from a small program to a staff of 16, serving nine classes, ranging from ages 15 months to 5 years, and ministering to a total of 97 children from St. B's and the community. Although the preschool has to meet stringent multi-level government guidelines and has received the highest 3-star rankings possible every year, the most important goal is to stay true to the Lord and what He has called the school to provide. The goal is to provide an education that develops the "whole person," just as Jesus grew in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and men. The school strives to provide for each child an educational experience of lasting values with biblical principles woven throughout.

Origin of the walking path

The walking path was built in 2006. Prior to that it was a rarely-used open field. The development included building the path and putting in memorial benches and trees. The initiative came out of a joint vestry meal in 2005 with the parish of St. Anne's in East Nashville.

Impressed with St. Anne's programming and facilities that ministered to the neighborhood, St. B's discussed ways to minister to our neighbors and determined that there was no place for our neighbors to walk. One member of vestry made a substantial one-time donation to the walking-path fund in memory of her recently-deceased mother, who had loved to walk.

To construct the path, David Morss and Dick Jewell dug it out; David Morss, Paul, Julia, Jonathan and Matthew Miller, Jerry and Marjie Smith, Michael Schober, Jud Laughter and Shirley Garth worked on preparing the path's foundation, and Jay Siegrist donated the gravel.

Once the walking path was established, a local neighbor on Belmont Park Terrace, Dr. Martin Katahan walked his dog Sheba there, daily. The once-abused rescue dog loved the routine.

As Sheba aged and became weaker, Dr. Katahan tried to limit the lengths of the walk but Sheba would have none of it. On her last day, Sheba insisted on going to the walking path and doing a circuit. That evening, the dog passed away peacefully in her sleep. Dr. Katahan donated funds in perpetuity for the upkeep of the walking path in Sheba's memory and in thankfulness to St B's for its open availability.

Mimi Heldman and Kendra Allen led the next phase, gathering memorial gifts for benches and trees. St. B's member Jerry Verner, of Tennessee Trees, furnished 64 trees, 26 tiger grass clumps, 24 maiden grass clumps and 35 nandina bushes. Seventeen of the trees are memorials given by the congregation.

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Long-time, tireless volunteers, Harry Xanthopoulos and Tom Hutchinson, work on the newly donated benches along the path. over 50 different countries attend the academy. In their initial roles, Mark served as a counselor and Susan as head librarian. For the last two years, the Powells have served as dorm parents in a boys' dorm. Trinity Dental Clinic

Trinity Dental Clinic was established in 2008, co-founded by St. B's missionaries and St. B's members, Dr. Keith and Kristin Chapman, under the organization SIM (Serving In Mission) just outside Monrovia, Liberia in West Africa. The clinic serves thousands of Liberian citizens each year utilizing Liberians who received training as dental practitioners through the project. Mission to Chile

Kay Morss, now deceased, a member of St. B's and life-long teacher, served from 2004 to 2006 as a missionary in Santiago, Chile, with the South American Mission Society. While there, she was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and came home the same day that Bishop Bauerschmidt was elected bishop (October 2006). She passed away the day after Thanksgiving, surrounded by her family in Kentucky.

Mission to Angola

From August 2006 to June 2007, Drs. Robert and Beth Riviello, St. B's long-term missionaries, did medical mission work at Centro Evangelico de Médicina do Lubango (CEML), in Angola, Africa, before going to Boston for further training.

Dinka language work

Deborah and the late Henry Martin were supported for a period by St. Bartholomew's in their Dinka language work. The Martins, who had served as missionaries in the Sudan, realized the importance to translation work of developing alphabets for the 26 Dinka dialects. They continued to work on it after their return from the Sudan. Deborah is still involved with ministry to the Sudan, as is the Martin's son. Kit.

The Sudanese

The Sudanese Ministry began in the mid-1990s when a St. B's Sunday School class prayed for God to show them a way they might minister in Africa. That Sunday School ministry evolved from providing bicycles for priests in Sudan to welcoming Sudanese refugees to Nashville.

In 1998, the Sudanese began worshiping at St. B's in Jieng, their tribal language, and English with lay pastors. In 2003, Bishop Nathaniel Garang, who was to become the acting Archbishop of Sudan, came to Nashville to ordain Gur Maror and John Awan as Episcopal priests. Both men have returned to serve their home country as priests.

Currently, the Sudanese community is still growing at St. B's and has a weekly Sunday morning worship service in Wallace Hall at noon led by lay pastors.

Room In The Inn

Every Saturday night during the months of November through March, St. B's cooperates with the Nashville-based Room In The Inn program to feed and house the homeless for the night. Teams pick up a screened group of homeless guests from a downtown center and bring them back to the gym for the night. They are provided by parish volunteers with dinner and breakfast before being driven back to the Campus for Human Development where the program is based.
